Since inception of the Regional Peace Programme (RPP) in 2016, AI - ECP has anchored the Youth In Action (YIA) network on four main pillars namely: growth, mentorship, foresight and creativity.

These pillars have been progressively and consistently accomplished through; training, storytelling for change, experience sharing and taking practical actions in communities. By building on foresight, we also introduced the youth to Freedom of Religion or Belief (FoRB) and the importance of peaceful co-existence in communities.

This year's, YIA focused on respect for others in diversity by identifing the challenges that communities are facing in promoting FoRB/social cohesion.

I am confident that this diverse network of young leaders will sharpen creativity, enrich skills/knowledge and embolden actions towards promoting social cohesion in their communities and the Eastern Africa and Africa Great Lakes Region at large.



Drawn from the Eastern Africa and Africa Great Lakes Region, 27 young leaders from diverse cultural and religious backgrounds, gathered in Kenya with one objective - promoting peace in the region. This was a new cohort of youths selected from Kenya, Uganda, Somalia, Sudan, South Sudan, Ethiopia, and Tanzania. This took place in a week-long forum held from 12<sup>th</sup> - 17<sup>th</sup> July 2021.

While welcoming the young leaders to the network, the Director, AI - ECP, Fred Nyabera lauded them as a great group of young people who have the potential to change the region.

"I believe you will develop a clear vision for yourself, your country and your community" he emphasized. He also challenged the youth to be innovative and present themselves as assets towards peacebuilding.

In his address to the youth, the Secretary General of the Global Network of Religions for Children (GNRC), Dr. Mustafa Y. Ali, expressed confidence that through YIA, the young leaders are better placed to be peace ambassadors in their communities and the region.

"The world is really looking up to youth to move the peace agenda forward" Dr. Mustafa Y. Ali

The manager of the Regional Peace Programme, Maria Osula similarly lauded the new cohort as a brilliant and active group of young people that are positioned to lead peace in their communities. While being introduced to the network, the youth were taken through an understanding of social cohesion within the lens of FoRB. The aim was to get the youth to gain an understanding of the significance of FoRB towards peace building and the need to embrace each others' religious beliefs as a way of promoting peaceful coexistence in communities.



#### Youth and Violent Extremism

The forum also reflected on violent extremism in the region with a view of rallying efforts among the new cohort to aid in preventing and countering violent extremism; thus promoting peace. It further underscored that youth have become the easiest targets for radicalization into violent extremism, citing some of the causes of violent extremism as; intra-faith and inter-faith intolerance, misinterpretation and misuse of religious scriptures to justify violence, misuse of social media platforms to spread extremist narratives. Ineffective strategies to positively tap into the youth energies, and direct them into constructive and non-violent actions were also discussed.

To understand why youth are often lured into violent extremism, the forum discussed some of the push and pull factors. Some of of these factors include: poor governance, historical injustices, prospect for fame/glory, lack of sensitivity to people's religion among others.

During the forum, youth developed their country action plans which detailed what they plan to do after the forum. The action planning session was important because it gave AI - ECP an idea of how the youth want to use the knowledge gained. Below is a brief of what they came up with:



#### **UGANDA**

Empowering and engaging Youth positively so as to build a better, sustainable and equitable world.



#### **KENYA**

Identify the effects of parenting and determine their influence on social cohesion, FoRB and violent extremism



#### **SOUTH SUDAN**

Fostering FoRB and Social Cohesion through awareness and capacity building



#### **SOMALIA and ETHIOPIA**

Select religious base conflict-prone areas and engage youth, religious leaders and the government in dialouge on peaceful coexistence.



#### **TANZANIA**

Promoting FoRB and Social Cohesion through media and social interactions



#### SUDAN

A focus on awarness, traning and research on FoRB and social cohesion. Establish a peace centre.

### Youths Perspective on FoRB, Peacebuilding, and Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism (PCVE)

- Religion is being used as a tool to promote discrimination in society. This has in many instances led to conflict and violent extremism. A better understanding of FoRB and promoting FoRB in communities can lead to effective PCVE and peacebuilding.
- Disinformation affects FoRB, Peacebuilding, and PCVE.
   Addressing disinformation will go a long way to support peace in local communities.
  - In situations of conflict or violations of FoRB, one area to look at is what connects the people within the community. Sometimes even using the fact that they are humans can go a long way to provide valuable and sustainable solutions to community problems.

Capacity building can be a useful methodology to promote FoRB, Peacebuilding, and PCVE. Targeted capacity building can be implemented focusing on the needs of the community.



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
#### What we are working towards as YOUTH!

#### **ABOUT YOUTH IN ACTION**

Youth In Action is a network of peace builders, comprising of youth and young influencers from 12 countries in Eastern Africa Region and Africa Great Lakes Region. They include: Burundi, Djibouti, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Kenya, Rwanda, Somalia, South Sudan, Sudan, Tanzania and Uganda.

Youth In Action is also an annual youth leaders' regional forum. Leadership skills and knowledge of the youth are enhanced through this forum, while tackling pertinent matters on peacebuilding, conflict transformation and FoRB.

The network was established by Arigatou International — Nairobi in partnership with Norwegian Church Aid (NCA) to empower young people to lead peace and promote justice, inclusion, and social cohesion in their communities. Since its inception in 2016, the network has had 5 annual regional forums.
